I'm probably driving everyone on Facebook crazy. This forced excessive downtime has given me the opportunity to use my brain power for other things when I don't feel like provoking Facebook drama. One thing I've been doing is finishing up an 11-year-old project I have been working on. I have used researching to avoid it. I have had to restart this project many times (a common theme for me). But I have finally reached a point where I am excited to reveal what this entails.

The idea for this project came when I first decided to build the St. John Genealogy website, but I didn't have enough smarts to make it happen. I have since taught myself all kinds of new things, a perk of being forced into retirement, I suppose. Anyway, I had released a few demo prototypes through the years, but they were clunky and not received well. I still had a learning curve to overcome. This time, I decided to do something different. Social Media is for the most part a normal part of society these days. But with it comes a lot of concern. In the last week alone, I had to make our Facebook group a closed forum. I had about

15 spam requests to join the group. I had to block them all. Those types of accounts hijack a group and poison the feed with spam and then target the members who post. Over the summer the website's front page was hacked by a group with a Facebook page that advertises their hacking and hijacking of website goals and victims. Facebook did not feel they violated terms of service. This in my opinion is ridiculous. After I fixed the vulnerability, I sent them their hacked file back and told them they needed to step up their game. They haven't been back.

Social Media has become a big business for their founders and a nightmare for their users. Even though we access these sites for free, we are bombarded with ads, our actions are tracked and assessed to make ads more relevant to us, our newsfeeds are altered, hidden, or removed from some so they can blackmail a person into purchasing posting power. My settings as group admin keep getting changed. It's not the environment I want as a genealogy forum. So, I have created a solution that I will be detailing throughout this newsletter. I hope each of you will seriously consider using it.

# Living Trees Genealogy Network (LTGN)

## A Collaboration & Social Network for Genealogists

### Introduction

After much trial and error, and overcoming a learning curve, I am proud to announce that I have a product I am excited to share with the St. John Genealogy community. *Living Trees Genealogy* popped into my head over a decade ago. In my mind, I could see it. It's taken me almost 11 years to finally present to you what I first envisioned. In the last year, I added *Network* to the name. LTGN or *Living Trees Genealogy Network* is finally a reality! As you can see, in the picture below, there is a secure sign up and log in. There is a logo. There is an intended audience. It is clean. It is not designed for anyone that simply wants an account. And, it will not cater to those with other intentions, good or bad. It's taken me years to create a logo I liked for more than five minutes. I created this final logo to depict the network name. In the pharmaceutical quality industry, where I retired from in 2010, we had what we called living documents. These were documents that we regularly audited, updated, reviewed, and trained on. In other words, once they were written and approved, they didn't eventually die, become forgotten, misplaced, or replaced, like great-grandma's family bible or genealogy records. Every day, these documents made up our work life. I see genealogy trees like a form of living documents only we call them gedcom files and family worksheets instead of Word or PDF files. So, the logo appears as trees and people collaborating and communicating together as a steady and intertwined constant to expand the core understanding of family history. That's what a social network for genealogists should provide. We don't find this in Facebook, or Twitter, or Pinterest, etc. and not even when we google *Genealogy Social Networks* will we find a place where you can have your genealogy and social network in its entirety without all the other clutter and distractions or additional costs. The picture frame represents a proud display of our family history as if we were hanging a picture on the wall. In a social network, you can in fact, post stuff to a wall. In the Living Trees Genealogy Network, you can post pictures, videos, gedcoms, links, etc. to the wall or to a blog or to an article or to a forum group. You, not the powers that be, decide where and what you post. Your actions won't be tracked beyond security monitoring and what is necessary to maintain user accounts. Advertisers will not target you by common words, behaviors, actions, or interests that target your everyday life and family. And, there is no political ideology influencing content you receive, no invasive advertisements popping up when you are trying to actively complete a task, no big brother censorship and tracking, and no unnecessary drama and trolling. I will also not hold your newsfeed or project notifications hostage to get you to buy "promotional ads" so more of your friends see what you post. I find this practice absolutely appalling. This community will be a safe place to share, learn, ask questions, answer questions, get help, provide help, and reach your goals. The reason I know this is because I will be monitoring registrations and public posts. And hopefully some of you will step up to be moderators, content experts, project managers, and many other available roles. It will also be free to use.


## Right Side Menus

On the right side of the screen there will be several menus. Each menu box corresponds to a specific function in the network.

### Logout Menu


The Logout Menu allows you to log out of course, but each text row below offers additional actions. And these actions are straight forward.

- When you successfully login, the system will greet you! In this example, the system says Hi, Suzanne St. John.
- If you have any private messages sent through the Private Message System, it will indicate so. In the example, I have 1 new private message that I have not yet read. Clicking on the text will take you to your private messages.
- If you have any new connection requests, it will indicate so. Clicking on the text will take you to a screen where you can manage your connections. (In Facebook, this is what we call Friend Requests. But, at LTGN, we are forming connections.)
- If you click View Your Profile you will be taken to your main profile page.
- If you click Edit Your Profile you will be taken to an edit screen for your main profile page.



### Members Online Menu

As the heading states, this is where members who are actively online will show up. These are people you can immediately collaborate with, interact with to form new connections, etc.



### Research Notes Menu

I will cover this in the section Research Notebook and Notes a bit later.

## Research Portal Menu

Here, you will have access to many common research sites. When you click on the site, it will open a portal within LTGN and display the site so you can research that site and collect research notes, etc. (Note: If you intend to go back and forth between multiple research sites, you will want to open multiple browsers where one is for each research site. You might be thinking, well I can already do this. It is true, you can, but within the LTGN site, regardless of which screen you have active any chats or notifications can still be directly seen while working in the LTGN network) And with the Research Notes tool, you can take all the notes you want without losing your place. This is especially helpful if you don't want to maintain a tree in each research site you use.

## Research Notebook & Notes

Research sites give you tools to attach records to your on-site trees but don't offer much else in the way of being overly helpful to collect information you may want to document elsewhere. For example, if your tree is at Ancestry.com and you are using FamilySearch.org or vice versa, it's not always easy to transcribe information from one to the other depending on where you house your official research tree. At Living Trees Genealogy Network, you will have your own tree where you can if you choose create your official tree. This tree you can easily update, download, delete, manage your media, etc. And, with the aid of your research notebook, you can keep notes up to date without wasting a lot of paper, running out of room, or misplacing them. In the example, I copied three records from FamilySearch.org into my research notebook that pertain to my father.
